This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

Details of our music curriculum

Music is part of the school culture at Maybury. It is a vibrant, exciting and important part of our school life.

We are committed to increasing access for disabled pupils and supporting pupil with special educational needs. Our Accessibility Plan [Maybury Primary School](#) provides details of how we will achieve this over a three-year period.

All staff (including visiting staff) are fully aware of any relevant additional needs in their classes. Lessons are adapted to be inclusive to all.

Time allocated per week for curriculum music

The National Plan for Music Education (NPME) recommend that schools timetable at least one hour each week of the school year for music throughout Key Stages 1 and 2.

We currently timetable:

- Key Stage 1 –Year 1 and Year 2: one hour per week
- Key Stage 2 - Year 3 and Year 6: one hour per week
Year 4: two hours per week
Year 5: 90 minutes per week

Music curriculum

- Our music curriculum is informed by the [model music curriculum](#) (March 2021), non-statutory guidance for teaching music from Key Stages 1 to 2 . It meets the scope and ambition of the national curriculum
- Our curriculum has been carefully planned so that children gradually improve technically, building knowledge of how music works and becoming more expressively sophisticated. The foundations for learning to read music are laid in EYFS and children are taught musical notation from Year 1. To further enhance understanding and appreciation of the works of the great composers and musicians, there is a planned whole school listening programme that encompasses music from a range of genres. Our music curriculum also ensures that children are equipped with the skills and personal attributes in order to be successful when performing at local, regional and national events.

Opportunities for pupils during lesson time

As a school, we provide a range of opportunities for pupils to learn to sing or play an instrument during lesson time.

Singing:

- We love to sing at Maybury! Singing is an important and integral part of the music curriculum at Maybury. This is delivered by class teachers as part of weekly music lessons
- Children sing in every assembly. In assemblies and in their classrooms, they practise hymns and songs for performances. These sessions are often led by the music lead or the headteacher. However, through ongoing CPD, all teaching staff are confident in teaching children to sing
- Children in Year 4 and Year 5 receive expert tuition by specialist staff from Choral Hull, through which they learn how to sing in groups and their experience of choral singing is cultivated

Playing an instrument:

- In Year 1, children begin to learn how to play the recorder as part of their weekly music lesson. This is taught by the class teacher
- In Year 2, children develop their recorder playing as part of their weekly music lesson. This is taught by the class teacher
- In Year 3, children learn to play the pBuzz (a precursor to a brass instrument) in their music lessons. These lessons are taught by an expert brass teacher from the Hull Music Service
- In Year 4, children progress to learning to play a brass instrument as part of their music lessons. These lessons are taught by an expert brass teacher from the Hull Music Service. The full range of brass band instruments are available for the children to learn: cornet, tenor horn, baritone, euphonium and trombone. Children are then able to opt to have additional brass lessons, which continue into Year 5 and Year 6 and are also eligible to join the school brass band
- In Year 5 and Year 6, children continue to develop their recorder playing through their curriculum music lessons which are delivered by the class teacher
- In addition to this, children in all year groups have access to a range of tuned and untuned percussion instruments. Our music curriculum identifies which instruments are to be used and when

Partnerships

Hull Music Hub support our music curriculum. The school has a service level agreement with the Hull Music Service, which are the lead partner for the Hull Music Hub. This supports our music curriculum in the following ways:

- A specialist (brass) music teacher delivers a weekly curriculum music lesson to our Year 3 class and our Year 4 class

- This brass specialist also gives brass instrumental lessons to children in Year 4, Year 5 and Year 6. These children progress into the school brass band
- An additional teacher – a percussion specialist - gives percussion lessons to a small group of children from each of Year 3, Year 4, Year 5 and Year 6. The children in Year 5 and Year 6 progress into the school percussion ensemble
- All children in Year 3 complete the ArtsMark Award

Over the past two years, the school has been part of the Choral Hull singing strategy. The school is one of the seven schools in the city which has become a 'choir school'. Choral leaders provide progressive and ambitious choral teaching and the children take part in a wide range of events throughout the year.

The school also employs a guitar tutor. Children progress from two beginner groups into an advanced group where they perform as the school guitar ensemble.

Maybury is a Music Mark school.

Part B: Extra-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Music outside of lesson time

Pupils can make progress in music outside of lesson time in the following ways:

- Children who have brass tuition lessons are loaned brass instruments by the Hull Music Service
- Children who have percussion lessons are loaned glockenspiels by the Hull Music service
- Our ensembles: choir, brass band, percussion and guitar, perform in a variety of venues across the year
- There are progression routes into ensembles run by the Hull Music Service at the Albemarle Music centre including wind bands, youth brass band, percussion ensemble
- Opportunities for children to join the Hull Minster Choir lead from our partnership with Choral Hull. Past and present members of our school choir are members of the Hull Minster Choir

Part C: Musical events

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.
